From the Parish

Rector's Reflection

Dear friends,

The parable of the Prodigal Son would have to be one of the best known stories in Luke's Gospel.

The name we ascribe it something of a misnomer, because there are two sons in the story and both are loved equally by their father. It is, however, the father who is essentially at stories centre, suggestive that 'The Parable of the Loving Father' might be a more fitting title.

Many struggle with this story, because they believe the father's love is wasted on the wasteful son. They sympathise with the dutiful and obedient older son who seems to get a raw deal. The story offends because it seems grossly unfair! Where's the justice? Should not the younger son be punished rather than rewarded for such flagrant disrespect?

However, this is not a parable about justice, it's a parable about grace which, more often than not, has nothing to do with justice. Justice is about righting wrongs - 'an eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth'; grace is the extension of compassion and forgiveness to those responsible for wrongdoing. Grace desires reconciliation between the wronged and the wrongdoer - grace is restorative; justice is retributive.

In this parable, the Father loves both sons, goes out to both sons, gives inheritance to both sons.

It is not a love of either/or, it's a love of both/ and. This parable epitomises Luke's genius for story-telling given its perfect illustration of the Father's (God's) unconditional love for all his children regardless of sin.

Luke invites us to identify with the parable's characters - I have been the rebellious adolescent who thinks he knows best. I've had to learn the hard lessons in the wilderness that come with abandoning the Father's love. I've had to swallow my pride and make the long, painful journey (of repentance) back to my Father (God), in search of forgiveness and healing.

I too, have to admit to being the older son, judgemental of others, because they didn't measure up to my moral standards and code of ethics. I too have been self-righteous and scandalised by leniency shown, by those more gracious than me, to those whom I felt to be undeserving.

Those of us with the ability to self-assess, recognise a time in our lives when we were the prodigal, and a time in life when we were the self-righteous older sibling. If we genuinely seek maturity in Christ, our aim should be to model our lives on the father's most gracious example.

In this parable, Jesus holds up the mirror to us and asks....'who, in the story, are you?'..

Readings for this week

Joshua 5.2-12

At that time the Lord said to Joshua, 'Make flint knives and circumcise the Israelites a second time.' So Joshua made flint knives, and circumcised the Israelites at Gibeath-haaraloth. This is the reason why Joshua circumcised them: all the males of the people who came out of Egypt, all the warriors, had died during the journey through the wilderness after they had come out of Egypt. Although all the people who came out had been circumcised, yet all the people born on the journey through the wilderness after they had come out of Egypt had not been circumcised. For the Israelites travelled for forty years in the wilderness, until all the nation, the warriors who came out of Egypt, perished, not having listened to the voice of the Lord. To them the Lord swore that he would not let them see the land that he had sworn to their ancestors to give us, a land flowing with milk and honey. So it was their children, whom he raised up in their place, that Joshua circumcised; for they were uncircumcised, because they had not been circumcised on the way.

When the circumcising of all the nation was done, they remained in their places in the camp until they were healed. The Lord said to Joshua, 'Today I have rolled away from you the disgrace of Egypt.' And so that place is called Gilgal to this day.

While the Israelites were encamped in Gilgal they kept the passover in the evening on the fourteenth day of the month in the plains of Jericho. On the day after the passover, on that very day, they ate the produce of the land, unleavened cakes and parched grain. The manna

ceased on the day they ate the produce of the land, and the Israelites no longer had manna; they ate the crops of the land of Canaan that year.

Psalm 32

(To be said by alternate half verse)

1 Blessed are those whose sin is forgiven: **whose iniquity is put away.**

2 Blessed are those to whom the Lord imputes no blame:

and in whose spirit there is no guile.

3 For whilst I held my tongue: my bones wasted away with my daily complaining.

4 Your hand was heavy upon me day and night: and my moisture was dried up like a drought in summer.

5 Then I acknowledged my sin to you: and my iniquity I did not hide;

6 I said 'I will confess my transgressions to the Lord':

and so you forgave the wickedness of my sin.

7 For this cause shall everyone that is faithful make their prayer to you in the day of trouble: and in the time of the great water-flood, it shall not come near them.

8 You are a place to hide me in, you will preserve me from trouble: **you will surround me with deliverance**

I will fasten my eye upon you, and give you counsel.

whose forward course must be curbed with bit and bridle.'

12 Rejoice in the Lord, you righteous, and be glad:

and shout for joy, all you that are true of heart

2 Corinthians 5.16-21

From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

The Gospel: Luke 15.11-32

Then Jesus said, 'There was a man who had two sons. The younger of them said to his father, "Father, give me the share of the property that will belong to me." So he divided his property between them. A few days later the younger son gathered all he had and travelled to a distant country, and there he squandered his property in dissolute living. When he had spent everything, a severe famine took place throughout that country, and he began to be in need. So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed the pigs. He would gladly have filled himself with the pods that the pigs were eating; and no one gave him anything. But when he came to himself he said, "How many of my father's hired hands have bread enough and to spare, but here I am dying of hunger! I will get up and go to my father, and I will say to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son; treat me like one of your hired hands." So he set off and went to his father. But while he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him. Then the son said to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son." But the father said to his slaves, "Quickly, bring out a robe—the best one—and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. And get the fatted calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate; for this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found!" And they began to celebrate.

'Now his elder son was in the field; and when he came and approached the house, he heard music and dancing. He called one of the slaves and asked what was going on. He replied, "Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fatted calf, because he has got him back safe and sound."Then he became angry and refused to go in. His father came out and began to plead with him. But he answered his father, "Listen! For all these years I have been working like a slave for you, and I have never disobeyed your command; yet you have never given me even a young goat so that I might celebrate with my friends. But when this son of yours came back, who has devoured your property with prostitutes, you killed the fatted calf for him!" Then the father said to him, "Son, you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. But we had to celebrate and rejoice, because this brother of yours was dead and has come to life; he was lost and has been found."'
